Ruth Myers, MD has specialized in persons with ID/A and complex needs since 1989. Her clinical work, consultations, presentations, CME presentations, research, and publications have focused on accurate diagnosis, effective treatment, elimination of coercive practices, recovery from trauma, and quality of life improvements for this group of individuals. As a result of working in an unusual specialty, she has been invited to provide clinical consultation, systems consultations, and program development in fifty states and several other countries. She has faculty appointments in several medical schools, and has served as a board examiner and senior board examiner for the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology. She has also served as an expert witness in various states for individual and class action civil lawsuits and criminal pro-

ceedings involving persons with ID/A. She has worked on teams involved with the deinstitutionalization and closure of large congregate facilities in several states. Prior to her work as a physician with persons with ID/A, she worked as a DSP in various residential settings. In 2002 she was invited to work with Dr. Stephen Myers in Alabama to help finally settle the historic 30+ year Wyatt v. Stickney class action suit.



John Goldman, MD is the Vice-President of Medical Affairs for UPMC Pinnacle, Assistant Designated Institutional Official for UPMC, and Epidemiologist for UPMC Central PA. He is also chair of the Infection Control Committee, Pharmacy and Therapeutics Committee, and the antibiotic subcommittee. He is active in teaching residents and medical students, and has won numerous teaching awards from UPMC Pinnacle and Drexel University. He has led the UPMC Pinnacle response to COVID since the start of the pandemic. He attended Dartmouth College, the University of Chicago Pritzker School of Medicine, and Tuft's New England Medical Center for an internship and residency in Internal Medicine and a fellowship in Infectious Diseases.
